This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), which shall be implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

'JICA Knowledge Co-Creation (KCC) Program' as a New Start

In the Development Cooperation Charter which was released from the Japanese Cabinet on February 2015, it is clearly pointed out that "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." We believe that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a center of mutual learning process.

## I. Concept

#### **Background**

Out of 56.9 million global deaths in 2016, 71% means 40.5 million were due to Non Communicable Diseases (NCDs). The main NCDs are cardiovascular diseases, cancers, diabetes and chronic lung diseases. The burden of these diseases is rising disproportionately among lower income countries and populations (WHO), and increasing the weight on the control in addition to infectious diseases and MCH issues as double burden.

At UN High-Level Meeting in 2011, it is announced that the need for international cooperation to tackle with those problems. Also agreed that the global community must work together to monitor, reduce exposure to risks, and strengthen health care for people with NCDs. It is adopted the political declaration of the High-Level meeting of the assembly on the prevention and control on Non-communicable Disease annexed to the present resolution.

#### For what?

This program aims to enhance the community health including countermeasures for NCDs.

#### For whom?

This program is offered to Ministry of Health, National/Local hospitals and Health center, especially persons who in charge of countermeasures for NCDs.

#### How?

Participants shall have opportunities to identify approaches and strategies to ensure program effectiveness, enhance community health, and improve the situation for their organizations.

Topics are including;

- 1) Epidemiology: Basic knowledge to understand how to collect useful data and interpret them correctly.
- 2) Community activities for primary prevention: Health promotion activities, volunteer activities in the community and nutrition counseling.
- Participants will formulate an action plan describing how the participant can understand the course contents and apply them after they go back to home country and discussed among others into their on-going activities in Japan.

This program is designed for Ministry of Health, National/Local hospitals and Health center, especially persons who in charge of countermeasures for NCDs.

## III. Conditions and Procedures for Application

## 1. Expectations from the Participating Organizations:

- (1) This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Participating organizations are expected to use the project for those specific purposes.
- (2) This program is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable the project to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.

#### 2. Nominee Qualifications:

Applying Organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

#### (1) Essential Qualifications

- 1) Current Duties: be an administrative official in National/local governments (including a staff in local health center) who in charge of countermeasures for NCDs.
- 2) Experience in the relevant field: have more than 5 years' experience in the field.
- 3) Educational Background: be a graduate of university
- 4) Language: have a competent command of spoken and written English which is equal to TOEFL iBT 100 or more (This workshop includes active participation in discussions, which requires high competence of English ability. Please attach an official certificate for English ability such as TOEFL, TOEIC etc, if possible)
- 5) Health: must be in good health, both physically and mentally, to participate in the Program in Japan. Pregnant applicants are not recommended to apply due to the potential risk of health and life issues of mother and fetus.

## (2) Recommendable Qualifications

- 1) Expectations for the Participants: Basic PC skill (Word, Excel, Power Point).
- 2) Age: be under fifty (50) years
- 3) Gender Consideration: JICA is promoting Gender equality. Women are encouraged to apply for the program.

#### 3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: The Application Form is available at the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan).
  - \* If you have any difficulties/disabilities which require assistance, please specify necessary assistances in the Medical History(1-(d)) of the application forms. It may allow us (people concerned in this course) to prepare better logistics or alternatives.
- (2) Photocopy of passport: to be submitted with the application form, if you possess your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it. \*Photocopy should include the followings: Name, Date of birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport number and Expire date.
- (3) Job Report: to be submitted with the application form. This is necessary documents for screening of an applicant and an applicant is required to submit his/her Job Report with the Application form. Each participant will be required to have presentation his/her Job Report in approximately 10 minutes in an early stage of training.
- (4) Nominee's English Score Sheet: to be submitted with the application form. If you have any official documentation of English ability. (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC, IELTS) Deadline of A2A3 application in JICA Sri Lanka office is .!!

### 4. Procedures for Application and Selection:

(1) Submission of the Application Documents:

Closing date for applications: Please inquire to the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan).

(After receiving applications, the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) will send them to the JICA Center in JAPAN by July 26, 2019).

#### (2) Selection:

After receiving the documents through proper channels from your government, the JICA office (or the embassy of Japan) will conduct screenings, and then forward the documents to the JICA Center in Japan. Selection will be made by the JICA Center in consultation with concerned organizations in Japan. The applying organization with the best intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection. Qualifications of applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military will be examined by the Government of Japan on a case-by-case basis, consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of

Japan, taking into consideration their duties, positions in the organization, and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner.

#### (3) Notice of Acceptance

Notification of results will be made by the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) not later than August 29, 2019.

#### 5. Conditions for Attendance:

- (1) to strictly adhere to the program schedule.
- (2) not to change the program topics.
- (3) not to extend the period of stay in Japan.
- (4) not to be accompanied by family members during the program.
- (5) to return to home countries at the end of the program in accordance with the travel schedule designated by JICA.
- (6) to refrain from engaging in any political activities, or any form of employment for profit or gain.
- (7) to observe Japanese laws and ordinances. If there is any violation of said laws and ordinances, participants may be required to return part or all of the training expenditure depending on the severity of said violation.
- (8) to observe the rules and regulations of the accommodation and not to change the accommodation designated by JICA.

#### 5. Expenses:

The following expenses will be provided for the participants by JICA:

- (1) Allowances for accommodation, meals, living expenses, outfit, and shipping
- (2) Expenses for study tours (basically in the form of train tickets.)
- (3) Free medical care for participants who become ill after arriving in Japan (costs related to pre-existing illness, pregnancy, or dental treatment are <u>not</u> included)
- (4) Expenses for program implementation, including materials For more details, please see "III. ALLOWANCES" of the brochure for participants titled "KENSHU-IN GUIDE BOOK," which will be given before departure for Japan.

#### 6. Pre-departure Orientation:

A pre-departure orientation will be held at the respective country's JICA office (or Japanese Embassy), to provide participants with details on travel to Japan, conditions of the workshop, and other matters.

## V. Other Information

#### 1. Job Report

As written in the "3. Required Documents to be submitted", each applicant is required to submit his/her own Job Report, using Power Point format. Participants will have a presentation of his/her Job Report at the earlier stage of the training in order to share knowledge and background with other participants as well as instructors. Accepted participants have to resubmit the softcopy of the updated Report at the arrival in Japan for the presentation.

If participants possessed any items below, please attach them to his/her Job Report.

- (1) Health education tool for local residents (booklet, brochure, etc.)
- (2) Epidemiological data on the district that participants are in charge.

#### 2. Action Plan

Participants are required to make an Action Plan at the end of the training to express idea and plan, which you carry out after you return, reflecting the knowledge and method you acquire from the training. Each person is requested to give a presentation. A laptop computer is recommended as an item to bring for preparation of action plan.

#### 3. Certification

Participants who have successfully completed the course will be awarded a certificate by JICA.

#### 4. Items to bring

- (1) A few days short trip to remote areas in Kagoshima prefecture by flights are included. A travel bag separate from your suitcase for short trip is recommended as an item to bring.
- (2) Participants will attend exercise class for local residents. Cloths and shoes suitable for exercise are recommended as items to bring.

#### 5. Remarks

This training is designed for the purpose of acquiring the knowledge and the techniques of Japan, NOT for a specific participant's country. Participants are kindly requested to understand the differences and not to insist on the techniques of their countries.

#### For Your Reference

#### JICA and Capacity Development

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they belong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs and are being customized to address the specific needs of different target organizations, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

#### Japanese Development Experience

Japan was the first non-Western country to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the core of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the "adopt and adapt" concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted and/or improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese society to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from this "adoption and adaptation" process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is rather challenging to share with our partners this whole body of Japan's developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of "tacit knowledge," a type of knowledge that cannot fully be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vastly differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of overcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
